The River Parrett flows through flat meadows and the surrounding hills yield hamstone and blue lias quarried for many years for buildings that add so much to the character of the area.



Within this landscape are also the sounds of creativity. A chisel on wood, a brush on canvas or even a folk singer recreating the songs of Cecil Sharpe, some of which were collected at Hambridge over 100 years ago.

CHIPS OFF THE BLOCK

Tom Clark explains his background and life as a stonecarver.

I began carving in 1974, first as a monumental mason and then as an ecclesiastical mason serving an apprenticeship at Chichester Cathedral. I became self-employed in 1981 and over the years have worked on many large and interesting restoration projects including St. George's Chapel in Windsor, Westminster Abbey, The National Gallery, The Public Records Office in London and Ely Cathedral.

In the early 1990s my focus shifted to the development of my own sculptural pieces, inspired largely by travels to India and Egypt as well as my love of medieval art. My orginal designs sell to private and corporate clients worldwide and through a number of galleries across the country.


I regularly accept commissions and this has increasingly led to the making of bespoke fireplaces in both traditional and contemporary designs.

I feel especially passionate about making this forgotten skill accessible to all and promoting the satisfaction derived from the creative process and the creation of an end product that can be shared and enjoyed by others. To this end I regularly run stonecarving courses, both at my studio and off-site at various locations across the south of England, including a series of relief carving courses at the V&A in London.


In particular I have had very rewarding experiences with local schools where the children have enjoyed seeing the finished sculptures emerge from the raw materials and recognising the significance of their own involvement. I live and work at Hurst Barton near Martock, where my 16th century hamstone house and grounds host a collection of workshops. This has supported the number of collaborative projects I am able to engage in and the opportunities for inviting students onsite to partake in sculpture and stonecarving courses.

Also on location is a showroom where my sculpture and carvings are on permanent display and which also houses a select number of exhibitions through the year.

STONE LOVE

James Thurtle introduces his company, Flagstone Restoration.

Shunning the 'new build' route, I have spent the last 30 years restoring and repairing older buildings, using traditional tools and materials. I have had the privilege to work along-side some great characters and craftsmen who were more than keen to pass on their knowledge. In the 90s I took some time out to study English and History at St Mary's University College, Twickenham. I started working part time for a restoration company to help pay the fees and ended up staying for seven years, working on some beautiful buildings in and around Richmond, Teddington, Chelsea and Putney.

Moving back to Somerset in 2000, I took on a barn conversion and looked to settle down. My daughter was born in 2001.

In 2005 I took on the position of head mason for a private property developer, spending a year restoring the stonework to Langlands Farm House in Kingston. When this came to a close I set about pooling all of my knowledge and experience into a specialist business – Flagstone Restoration was born.

Flagstone Restoration is a small, craft based company that specialises in restoring original,

in-situ flagstone floors to their former glory. We work with Blue Lias, Welsh Pennant, Hamstone and Purbeck on a regular basis.

Flagstones were referred to as "the lungs of the house" regulating the moisture content of the ground floor and walls, enabling the building to breath as a cohesive whole. Our aim is to strip back the many years of ingrained dirt, grime and contaminates, opening up the pores of the stones, breathing new life into the sub-structure of the building. As a result, not only does the floor breathe as intended, it helps to remove any damp odour, often associated with older buildings.

Much more than a cleaning service, our company provides a full restoration service for any natural stone floor. We pride ourselves on attention to detail, drawing from many years in the conservation of stone. Using dustless technology, we have a number of mechanical options at our disposal, cutting down on time and cost to the client.

The old pointing is always removed and replaced with a lime putty based mix, ensuring maximum breathability. We use our blended 'Somerset Mix' for the majority of Blue Lias floors, which has been toned down to be easy on the eye.

LOG ON TO WOOD TURNING



Dave Appleby explains his love of working with wood.

My craft is woodturning, a form of woodworking that uses a lathe to create objects like bowls, platters chair legs and candlesticks. A lathe is a machine which spins the work piece so woodturning differs from most other forms of woodworking in that the wood is moving while a tool is held steady and positioned to cut and shape it as it rotates.

I haven't always been a professional woodturner but working with wood and particularly woodturning was an important part of my life. After a day in the office I could unwind by retreating to my workshop and use my hands to create items both functional and artistic.

In 2001 I switched careers and became a professional woodturner and soon found myself demonstrating around the area and providing tuition in my workshop. My enjoyment is making artistic pieces for galleries which I have at the Somerset Guild of Craftsmen in Wells, Ace Arts in Somerton and Yandles gallery in Martock as well as further afield in Dorset at Dansel Gallery in Abbotsbury.

Working with timber that would otherwise go on the log pile for burning is a particular joy. It is the ultimate in 'recycling' to turn an apparently useless piece of wood into a functional and artistic item.

I often take commissions from people who have had a tree down in their garden that has a special significance for them and their family - they want pieces made as a reminder of that relationship with a 'living' tree.

The Peat of the Somerset Levels hides a very special wood 'bog oak', buried in floods over 5,000 years ago it occasionally comes to the surface when a farmer is digging out the rhynes or ploughing his fields. It is hard to dry successfully but when turned and finished it has a deep rich ebony colour and is quite a treasure.


The different grain, texture and colour of woods never cease to amaze me. Every piece of wood is unique.

Cutting into a piece of timber to reveal these features is part of the excitement and I always try to allow what is revealed to influence my work. Knots and natural splits are not imperfections but opportunities. I am constantly looking to create beautiful forms and develop new carving textures in the wood, incorporating gold leaf or natural materials like leather if it feels right.



The Wheel Spins in High Ham

Rob Ellis gives some background to his love of pottery.

I first became interested in pottery in 2002 when my wife persuaded me to accompany her to a nightclass run by David Brown (dbpottery of Merriott) at Yeovil College. The early weeks of hand-building slab pots and coiled vases did little to stir my enthusiasm; then I tried my hand at 'throwing'!

After a few terms I had become hooked and decided to invest in my own wheel and kiln. I have now taken over the garage and conservatory as my workshop/display space with an assortment of wheels and kilns fitting amongst the paint pots and garden tools – a truly rustic affair! I juggle my pottery around a full-time job but I hope one day to swap my desk for a potter's wheel.

My work is mainly functional kitchenware, including mugs, jugs, teapots and bowls, although I also like to throw larger, more challenging pieces and am always looking for ways to enhance my pots by adding facets, texture and simple decoration while retaining the basic, traditional forms I have always preferred.

All of my pots are hand-thrown. Until recently they were all fired to stoneware in an electric kiln but I have now built myself a small gas reduction kiln where many of the pots are now glaze fired to Cone 10. The main glaze colours include blues, tenmoku, copper reds and celadon green. I also use simple wood ash glazes which vary according to the specific type of ash used. I enjoy experimenting with the endless possibilities of reduction firing and am constantly grappling with the unpredictability that this method of firing



brings. A larger gas kiln is currently under design and when complete, will help increase the volume of pots I can produce.

I am a member of the Westcountry Potters Association and 'Ellis Pottery of High Ham' can be found at local street fairs and in selected shops or you can view my pottery, by appointment, at home.

Sara's role is selling the pottery so you will probably meet her at the local street fairs. She does dabble with the making side although her pieces are usually heart shaped (and lean away from my philosophy of each piece having a function – 'being pretty' would be her answer). Sara's range includes mugs, jugs, bowls, buttons and necklaces with colours including blues, whites, reds, pinks and purples.

Glass As You Like It



Will Shakspeare is one of the country's best known glass blowers. He has been featured regularly in the press and on TV including Inside The Factory, Kirstie's Homemade Home and Kirstie's Homemade Christmas with Kirstie Allsopp, and in the Telegraph Magazine with David Nicholls.

Will set up Shakspeare Glass over 25 years ago and has supplied many galleries and well-known stores in that time. He has also worked in Central and South America as a consultant in glass production and design for various NGOs. In more recent years he has been joined by his wife Kate who generally looks after the trade side of things. Will works with a small and very talented team of glass assistants, and has fantastic help with all other aspects from some fab locals.

Will says of his work: "I make a wide range of different designs which are constantly evolving. I deliberately design glass with a random factor, an aspect that is beyond my control. I try and use colour so that it affects the final shape of the piece in a natural and fluid way. In doing this I have to work with the glass rather than completely imposing my own constrictions." And on inspiration "There is something magical about water, from just wondering why the bath always drains one way to the awesome destruction of the ocean.

"I have always loved rock pools; I have albums of photographs taken over the years of different pools in different places. They fascinated me when I was small and they still do.

Now the flow of the tide is becoming an intrinsic part of my work, both in pools and the sea. The reflection of sunlight as the tide pulls back and forth on the plants and creatures in the water is something that has eluded me with a camera or pencils. To me it seems plain to use glass as a medium for this expression. Glass captures the qualities I love about the sea and water in a fluid way as no other can. "I am also getting more influenced by the landscape around the levels, the relationship and colours of the sky and land. I love looking at what joins them, the rhynes, reeds and willows."

Having accumulated many years of specialised knowledge and experience, handed down by his father and grandfather, Michael is passing the knowledge to son Jack, the fourth generation and youngest willow grower in Somerset.

Based on the Somerset Levels, world-renowned as the home of the willow industry, the Musgroves, from their Willow Fields base, grow 100 acres of over 60 willow varieties and run a host of educational courses. All of their crop is processed at home, using traditional methods and working sensitively with the environment, ensuring ultimate control and quality.

The willow is used by many different people for a wide variety of projects. Musgrove Willows is a leading supplier of willow to independent basket makers, art colleges, schools and youth organisations, retail and commercial customers. Musgrove's willow is regularly distributed all over the world and used by the National Trust, Natural England and the RSPB.

Traditional Somerset bundles of willow are used for basketry, sculpture, craft and hurdle making. Many different varieties and colours of willow are available for ornamental use and flower arranging.

Living willow has become very popular as a form of fencing and garden decoration. Tailor-made kits are supplied ready to plant with instructions, available January to April.

Hand woven willow coffins are made with willow from sustainable withy beds and are appropriate for burial, cremation, woodland and green burial sites.

Coates English Willow

Tucked away in the rural village of Stoke St Gregory in the heart of the Somerset Levels, the Coate family have been growing withies on the moors since 1819 and making willow baskets and willow charcoal for almost 50 years. The unique wetland environment of the Somerset Levels and moors is perfect for growing willow as well as being a haven for wildlife. Basket making willow has been grown here for two centuries, and it is now the only area left where it is still commercially grown and processed for the production of baskets, furniture, garden items and high quality artists' charcoal.

If you are curious about how the baskets are made, you can join one of their guided tours.

Hear the whole willow story, from planting a willow sett, to finishing a basket. The very special museum is free of charge to wander around and wonder about the days before plastic when baskets were used for virtually everything. It is full of baskets, willow curiosities and artefacts from over 100 years ago.

For those not into shopping, perhaps a Willow Walk exploring this special landscape would be a great alternative. There are 3 different paths you can choose from and the Willow Sculpture Trail is a popular feature with the children.





Lydia Needle

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Be All and End All

Lydia Needle explains her remarkable work.

I'm a textile and mixed media artist from Somerset. I work with a range of found, salvaged and beach-combed materials combined with wool but it is always the wool itself that inspires my practice. All of my work has an emphasis on the environment and sustainability and my current major creative project is called, 'FIFTY BEES: The Interconnectedness of All Things' and was devised to showcase the plight of the British bee.

The FIFTY BEES project began because I came to realise how very ignorant I was about bees, despite my lifelong interest in the natural world. My primary focus throughout the project is to research and to learn as much as possible about our bees.

To this end, I sculpt small, individual art pieces from wool and thread inside a range of wonderful vintage containers; so far there are one hundred sculptures but I am aiming to complete 262, one for each of Britain's species of bee. The containers as these are a vitally important part of the FIFTY BEES project. Not only are they the frames for the artwork but they are also like characters in the story so they have to talk to me and I have to fall in love with them a little bit in order to be inspired to work into them, to transform them into something new and unique. The size, shape, sound, touch and, sometimes, even the smell of a container helps me to decide what creature to build inside.

For each of the FIFTY BEES exhibitions, another fifty artists, makers, writers and musicians produce one new work in response to one of my bee pieces, in order to give a fuller illustration of the diversity of our bee population, how endangered it is and how our pollinators are completely interlinked with our ecosystem.

Inventive Use Of Space

Rob Thompson outlines his work as a furniture maker.

I moved to a smallholding in Somerton from Surrey in 2011. My background after a design degree was designing and making film and TV props and models, I then moved into special effects. I spent a lot of time pattern making and manufacturing carbon components for motorsport. I started designing and making furniture for myself, then friends and it grew from there.

I have a fully equipped workshop including spraying and can work in a range of materials in addition to traditional hardwoods such as mdf, plywood, metal, plastics and carbonfibre. I also have access to modern production techniques such as CNC (Computer Numerically Controlled) for accurate repeat components. After a customer makes contact I generally visit and talk through their requirements. At this point we can discuss the best way to go around their project. I can create built-in and freestanding pieces. We will decide if it should be solid timber, incorporate sheet material such as mdf, veneers or plywood etc. I will bring along a range of sample materials and finishes to help the process. If a spray finish is required I use furniture grade water based paints and can match any colour. Once I have enough information including an idea of budget I can produce drawings and accurate costings. Drawings can be by hand or created on a computer.

All jobs are made at my workshop and delivered as near to finished as possible. I try to minimise the time spent in the house to reduce the dust and disruption.



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C K Garden Sculptures

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OUTSTANDING IN THE GARDEN

Chris Kampf studied at Leicester Poly gaining a BA Hons in jewellery and silversmithing back in 1988. He designed and made jewellery for three years before joining The Steelworks, which gave Chris a wonderful opportunity to weld various designs: desks, wall art, lighting and a selection of weird animals, all from the Camden Lock gallery. In 1993, a move to Covent Garden and the creation of Rex The Mouse brought a whole new audience which has kept Chris busy for the best part of twenty years. While Rex is still going strong, Chris' eyesight needs a rest from the intricate welding Rex requires.

Larger designs had been brewing in his mind. Garden sculpture was the outcome and the success of the first sculptures in the spring of 2013 gave Chris the confidence give them their own website. Based on natural forms, Chris' simple interpretation of leaves and buds in steel, stand out well against a garden backdrop. His designs have 360 degree interest, framing plants and buildings, while the steel surfaces reflect both sky and vegetation.

Living in Martock and working from a shed in the garden has allowed Chris to keep up his ethical stance. There is a wonderful selection of businesses locally including a well-stocked timber yard, metal works and powder coaters. All are great to work with and put up with Chris looking for scrap and off cuts.

The making of these sculptures has taken several twists and turns but Chris has settled with mig welding the strips of mild steel (sometimes recycled) to a thick steel rod, bending and sanding before welding on to a steel plate. Once aged for 4-5 weeks in the garden, which requires many sprays of water to advance the rusting process, the 'Rustic' sculptures are finished with a couple of coats of specialist oil for protection. This also gives them a natural darker brown sheen. Some sculptures are mounted on green oak plinths while others are staked directly into the ground, as if they are growing from the soil. These are called 'Lawn' sculptures which also are suited to various locations in the garden such as under trees or in beds where plants can grow around them. To complete each piece, Chris has saved lead from the roof of his house, cut into square coins and stamped with a CK. These are attached to the sculptures as his signature.

World Class Chocolates

At the risk of embarrassing her, I have just met the most elegant, gracious, compassionate and modest lady – and she makes the best chocolates In The World. Jane Swayne only started in 2014 but she has created something very special in her Gilbert & Swayne hand-made chocolates.

Chocolate came into Jane's life when she stayed with her eldest daughter in the Hague; it was her husband's birthday and she wanted to make something for him, since he is a well-respected Maker – of bagpipes, flutes and whistles. Her daughter's friend is a chocolatier who helped her make some chocolates – tarragon and seasalt – which were superb, and much appreciated. She made more for friends and eventually realised she wanted to learn properly. After an initial course at Meneer Chocola in the Hague, she completed her training with World Master chocolatier Ruth Hinks of Cocoa Black.

She equipped the top floor of the barn in which Jon makes his musical instruments, and now, with a new chocolate fridge installed (they had to take the staircase down to get the fridge up!), she is able to increase production. Only the best ingredients are used – Fair Trade and Single Origin specialist chocolate, herbs from the garden in summer (expanded with a new greenhouse), Somerset Cider Brandy, Eau de Vie and Kingston Black Aperitif from Julian Temperley and special collection coffee from Reads of Sherborne.

The process is complicated and difficult with many chances for mistakes – getting the

right ratio of sugar crystals to raw chocolate, temperature control on the three melting tanks, the tempering, the thickness of the shells (too thin and they won't easily come out of the moulds – too thick and there's not enough room for the flavoured ganache).

The packaging is a very high-class co-operation with Jane's sister in law Dinah Swayne who is now her next door neighbour. A professional book conservator, she sources the glorious end papers from Florence, then covers the boxes in the Italian Collection with consummate skill. They themselves are collectors' pieces and customers have been known to return these boxes for refilling. The Classic Collection comes in discreet black boxes, each hand written with 'Gilbert & Swayne' in gold lettering by Becky Price, a calligraphist in the village who will also write personal messages on the boxes. The latest collection is the Jewellery Boxes, one, a cube, opens up to reveal three tiers of treats encased in a Liberty handkerchief: another offers boxes within a box, with three 72 chocolate cubes plus space to include the donor's own bottle of champagne or homepressed apple juice; others are big enough to take up to 100 chocolates - the ultimate spoiling present.

If you want to curry favour with anyone you will quadruple your success rate by giving them some of Gilbert & Swayne's chocolates: Guaranteed.



John Gammans



My artwork is my way of trying to distil and bottle a remnant of something that has taken my breath away or caused me to be in awe, but most importantly created an emotional response.

I want my artwork to represent the derived emotion of the subject, to convey something of the feeling, not to dictate, but to start a personal narrative, like a memory to the observer.

My inspiration is the natural world, especially the weather and it's effect on light and colour in landscapes. I have come to realise that it is the formation and erosion created by the natural world that is my greatest inspiration. The formation of a weather systems to create beautiful dramatic skies to the erosion, caused by the same, that creates our landscapes, coastlines and forests.

The manner in which I work is very representative of the very thing that inspires me. I try not to make too many conscious decisions, relying on instinct and feeling more than anything else. I hardly ever use brushes, choosing to work preliminarily with palette knives, rags and anything else that is at hand. I like to encourage happy accidents, forming layers of paint and powdered pigments before using several invasive techniques to create erosion.

I feel that my artwork is my own little time capsule, recording my personal perspective of this world, capturing my emotions and speaking a million words where I cannot. I hope that my artwork will resonate with others and invoke something of the awe and majesty that sparked within me.

I have paintings in private collections in the UK, US, Canada and Finland. For the past two years I have had pieces hung at The Atkinson Gallery, Millfield.
